Best Foot Forward gives kids in foster care resources to thrive

Since its 2010 founding, the organization – the only one of its kind in Palm Beach County – has a 100% high school graduation rate with its kids.

hildren enter the foster care system for any number of reasons — abuse, neglect, abandonment, to name a few. These kids did not create, nor can they control, their unfortunate circumstances.

But there's one thing they all have in common: The day they turn 18 they're legally considered adults.

While this used to mean instant homelessness, Florida law now enables teens to remain in licensed foster care or approved supervised "independent living environments" until they're 21, provided such accommodations are even available.

That said, the gaps in coverage for these kids in terms of emotional and financial support can have devastating consequences.

Dropping out of high school (around 54% do).

Becoming homeless or a perpetual "couch surfer" — which happens to 40%.

Getting arrested — which also happens to 40%.

And the unlikelihood of becoming a college graduate — which only 3% do — makes it virtually a pipe dream.

But there's one agency in Palm Beach County — Best Foot Forward (BFF) — solely dedicated to mitigating the long odds facing foster kids.

Founded in 2010, BFF provides one-on-one support to improve a

student's educational experience.

Among the ways the organization does so:

- Being involved from kindergarten through college.
 - Meeting regularly in schools.
- Collaborating with all
- stakeholders.

 Bridging the gap between
- Bridging the gap between child welfare and school.
- Consistent support throughout the years.
- Teaching skills in test-taking, studying and organization.
- Providing individual academic tutoring.
- Communicating with schoolteachers.Providing remedial reading
- Teaching kids how to be one's
- own self-advocate.

 Providing ongoing incentives and motivation.

The BFF program has been remarkably successful: Kids who go through it have a 100% high school graduation rate.

Of course, such services and results would not be possible
